He Gets Us vs. He Saves Us

Dear Saints of Redeemer,

This Superbowl a group called "He Gets Us" again aired two commercials (last year they aired two others). The first dealt with the topic of foot washing, and the second with the question of who is my neighbor. According to the group, the two were intentionally related. In the first they cycled a number of images of different people washing another's feet, a reference to the events on Maundy Thursday wherein our Lord Jesus washed the feet of the disciples. The ad then concludes with the statement: "Jesus didn't teach hate. He washed feet"

In the event in the scriptures, our Lord says to the disciples: ""Do you understand what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord, and you are right, for so I am. If I then, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have given you an example, that you also should do just as I have done to you." This is significant because it frames the washing of the disciples feet in the context of the Lord's sacrificial death for the sins of humanity. His washing the feet of the disciples as an example to them of sacrificial humility is then reflected in the call to act in sacrificial humility toward one another. Washing feet is a symbol of the actual command: do to others as I have done to you.

The next ad follows up in this vein by showing a number of different people with the question: "Who is my neighbor?" and then answering in this way: "The one you don't notice, value, welcome." Again, this is an obvious reference to the parable of the Good Samaritan wherein Jesus is answering the question of the lawyer: "Who is my neighbor." In the parable, a couple of things are important. First, the question of the Lawyer is asked with the context of having been instructed in the nature of the commandments to love the Lord with all one's heart, soul, mind, etc., and to love one's neighbor as one's self. The lawyer, then, seeking to justify himself, asks the question which prompts the parable. Second, the conclusion of the parable provides the answer: "Who then proved to be a neighbor to the man who fell among the robbers? The one who showed him mercy. You go and do likewise." So, again, the point of the text is that there is a sacrificial nature of us toward our neighbor which mirrors that of our Lord (the Good Samaritan in the parable is clearly a picture of Christ).

While it might seem at first glance that these commercials, and the organization behind them, are pointing us toward Christ and the scriptures, when you look a bit closer you realize this isn't the case. They are pointing to a guy named Jesus, and to some of the same concepts or same language of the scriptures, but there's an aspect of all their ads and articles which is noticeably missing: the cross.

There are a myriad of issues with the theology, background, and claims of the He Gets Us ad campaigns and with the organization itself, but the primary issue is that it presents a Jesus and a Christianity which has no need or use for the cross. The forgiveness of sins and eternal life in the blessed resurrection are almost nowhere to be found. The changing of the Christian's life from one of darkness and sin to one of light and right-eousness is unneeded. This is what makes the group and its theology so dangerous and something to be avoided. (Continued on page 2)

Jesus doesn't just get us, he saves us from our sins, redeems us from eternal condemnation, restores us to the Father, moves us from darkness to light, makes and keeps us holy and righteous, creates in us new and clean hearts, and so much more. And all of this flows out of the cross.

¹⁷ Therefore he had to be made like his brothers in every respect, so that he might become a merciful and faithful high priest in the service of God, to make propitiation for the sins of the people. ...¹⁴ Since then we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast our confession. 15 For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin. ¹⁶ Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need. ...¹¹ But when Christ appeared as a high priest of the good things that have come, then through the greater and more perfect tent (not made with hands, that is, not of this creation) 12 he entered once for all into the holy places, not by means of the blood of goats and calves but by means of his own blood, thus securing an eternal redemption. ¹³ For if the blood of goats and bulls, and the sprinkling of defiled persons with the ashes of a heifer, sanctify for the purification of the flesh, 14 how much more will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without blemish to God, purify our conscience from dead works to serve the living God. 

The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod: Stewardship Ministry "Cherish What God Has Given"—March 2024

In the Small Catechism, Luther follows a pattern when explaining the Ten Commandments. With each commandment, there is something prohibited, and something commanded. There is something wrong which must be avoided, and there is something right which must be done.

The one time this pattern is not followed is with the Sixth Commandment.

"You shall not commit adultery. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we lead a sexually pure and decent life in what we say and do, and husband and wife love and honor each other" (SC I).

Here, the catechism focuses solely on the positive: we should live in a chaste and decent manner in both word and deed, and husbands and wives should cherish and honor one another.

Keeping this commandment, and all of the commandments, is a lot easier if you see your chastity and your spouse as a gift from God that is to be protected and cherished. In the same way, you will find keeping the Fourth Commandment easier if you see your parents and other authorities as a gift from God, given to you for your blessing.

This is the key stewardship insight that runs through all of the Christian life: Everything that we have has been given to us by God. We deserve none of it. All of it comes to us by God's fatherly kindness and open-handed generosity. If I know that everything I have — every possession, every relationship, every ability — is a gift from God, then my perspective changes. All of these things are both gifts to be cherished, and things that I should direct towards God's purposes. My possessions should be shared generously according to how God has called me in my family, church and community. My spouse should be cherished, loved and encouraged in faith. My children are on loan from my own Heavenly Father, and I have but a brief time to show them the path of righteousness. My neighbor is a gift from God so that I can imitate His kindness toward me.

No matter the gift, everything has been given to me by God so that I may participate in His own goodness and open-handed generosity. - lcms.org/stewardship
